Treasure of Daitokuji Monastery. Indeed we were astonished to read the name of Daitokuji because it is one of the most famous Zen Monasteries in Kyoto. The sound of this GONG shakes our HARA and the color is enchanting.

Of course it is too big to be in the present New York Zendo but we couldn't bear to leave that treasure in the antique shop so we decided to buy it anyway, and it is here with us now. We are convinced that the sound of this GONG will greatly encourage and influence our Zazen. And it must be this Zazen which will eventually establish a permanent Zen Monastery in the United States. This is our vow.

The GONG cost one thousand dollars which is indeed beyond our power to pay, so we hope that you will help us as much as you possibly can.
